






60% of Africa land is not utilized or not under proper agricultural management properly








Currently, Africa spends more US \$35 billion a year on imports of agricultural produce, while exports are negligible. The share of intra-African trade is less than 5 percent. By 2050, the African population is expected to be about 2 billion. To feed this population, and going by the current import trend, the food import bill would be US \$110 billion in 2025.



Between now and 2050, the population of sub-Saharan Africa is expected to double from 1.1 billion to 2.4 billion. As the population grows, so will the demand for agricultural land to produce food. To sustain this expanding population, it is crucial that nations on the continent work to increase their agricultural production. With sub-Saharan Africa having 50 percent of the world's agricultural land, one might think this is a simple fix. However, only about 1 percent of that land is useful for long-term cultivation. This gap is primarily due to nutrient deficiencies in the soil, sub-optimal land management, pest infestations.







TANZANIA'S AGRICULTURE SECTOR TO GROW BY 10% IN 2030 - SAMIA

President Samia Suluhu Hassan has said Tanzania expects it's agriculture sector to grow at an annual rate of 10% by 2030 compared to the current growth of around 3.6% as part of the country's ambitious agriculture transformation vision.

The President said Tanzania has developed a national pathway for food system transformation, which is expected to strengthen local production, improve livelihoods, help mitigate and adopt to climate change.

She made the remarks in her speech as a panellist at a session on 'Food Action Partnership: Investing in Greater Resilience', on the sidelines of the World Economic Forum's Annual Meeting in Davos, Switzerland.

In implementing a sustainable food system in Tanzania, President Samia said a number of efforts have been done, including establishing a programme for youth, while continuing to build on the successful work of agricultural growth corridors such as SAGCOT.

From this financial year, Tanzania's budget for the agriculture sector was increased 4 times from the previous budget. Tanzania also plans to host Africa's Food Systems Forum this September to showcase progress and learnings.

The Food Action Alliance session convened more than 50 leaders from Africa, Asia, Europe and the Americas to accelerate partnerships and investments for greater resilience at country-level.

Among the panellists scheduled to speak on achieving food system goals were Hon. Gustavo Petro, President of Colombia, Tran Hong Ha, Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Natural Resources and Environment from Vietnam and Alvaro Lario, President of the International Fund for Agricultural Development (IFAD), Rome.

Transforming the potato value chain

- Location: Ihemi (Iringa and Njombe) and Mbarali (Mbeya and Songwe)
- Revision of the Seed Act of 2003 to allow seed marketing, joining UPOV
- Bringing in professionalism and international varieties via private company HZPC
- Regulator (TOSCI): Trained in regulating seed potato
- A potato partnership established and brings together land preparation, fertilizer, seed, crop protection, and storage marketing companies to establish or expand businesses
- Market: Local and regional market Tz is still importing potatoes from South Africa, Egypt, Europe etc.



SUCCESS TO DATE

- Demand for clean seeds increased
- Productivity in farmers fields increased from less than 8mt to 30 Mt per hectare
- Emergence of 4 new seed companies
- Farmers' demand for seeds outstrips supply many times.

Transforming lives through tomato value chain



- Tomato most important vegetable in Tanzania
- New Investments: RAHA Farm with our partner Green Vale Agro, for soil health and moisture management via *mtumbwi* technology
- In a joint effort to support Medium and Small-Scale youth women entrepreneurs, SCL facilitated the expansion of the Raha Farm seedling nursery.
- Promotion of protected horticulture cropping system screen houses

SUCCESS TO DATE

- Increased production of tomato seedlings from 3,000 to 400,000 per month.
- Increased value of sales from 1,500,000 TZS to TShs 8.0 million
- Increased number of employees from 15 to 58, with 85% being women.
- Increased productivity under smallholder farmers
- Opening a new 10 acre site and a new centre in Tanga region.



Transforming lives through poultry keeping



- New Investments: e.g. Silverlands, AKM Glitters, AFRIFARM and Tanfeeds International
- Business environment: Most of the policy challenges have been removed – now perfecting the systems e.g. removal of multiple regulatory institutions
- Local and international investors are becoming interested.
- Providing markets for local maize, soya and sunflower seeds cakes

SUCCESS TO DATE

- Removal of VAT on processes animal feeds
- Removal of VAT on additives
- Increased demand for day-old chicks and animal feeds
- Introduction of modern poultry breeds in many rural communities

2023 Production and Aggregation cycles- Pilot

- □ 21,725 Farmers Profiled (38% F, 21% Youth below 35 years old)
- 140 Soybean Demo farms and 48 model farms established across 19 District Councils
- □ 66 Clusters "hotspot" established, the distribution of clusters across regions is as follows: Songwe (11), Rukwa (9), Ruvuma (11), Njombe (9), Iringa (9), Mbeya (6), and Morogoro (6).


SEED SYSTEM

- New introduced seed varieties TGx2001-11DM and TGx2001-10DM currently NPTs
- 4.5 MTs of Basic seeds have been harvested. This is 90% of the target (5 MTs)
- 25 MTs of certified seeds are available for the 2023/2024 season




Strategy Development and Commodity Compact

- ☐ The government, through the Ministry of Livestock and Ministry of Agriculture, endorsed the formulation of a standalone National Soybean Development Strategy.
- A task force proposed to champion the process under the guidance of SAGCOT.
- □ Private sector commitments to provide input financing received notably from CRDB 4B, NMB 500M, EFTA, and EQUITY.
- Investment notes covering seed production, processing, and commercial extension service developed and presented by the Ministry of Agriculture at the World Food Forum

The IGG Tools is successfully revised:

Based on feedback/input from users and partners

- Scoring ratings re-configured and clarified
- Scoring categories elaborated to take the guess-work out of selecting a category
- Included climate change and nature-based solutions
- Developed Excel version to facilitate scoring and self-tracking/monitoring over time

Next Steps

- Agree on printing and dissemination plan of the revised tools—Alignment with WWF and IUCN started
- Align better with PASS IGG Tool ---this has already started
 - Identify synergies that would reduce duplication of effort (e.g., updating compliance requirements)
 - Standardize recommendations for improvements based on tool performance
 - Reflect on potential implications for support for high scorers (e.g., certain value chains fundamentally will score higher than others)
